Program

Lion Scott Starosta was our speaker tonight on the subject of his recent visit and tour of Leader Dogs for the Blind facility in Detroit, Michigan.

Lion Scott represented our Club in an offer for one of our members to visit the Leader Dog organization at its training facility in Detroit, Michigan. Lion Scott said that it was a great experience to see the great impact that a trained leader dog has on the life of a blind person. Scott explained that the first thing that a potential guide dog owner is to learn to navigate with a cane and feel comfortable with it. After that the potential owner has to spend about 3 weeks training and bonding with the dog. While he was at their training site, he got to use a leader dog while blind-folded and experienced eating a meal blind-folded, also. The dogs respond to a great many particular commands. Starting about 7 weeks after they are born, most of the facilities dogs are first trained by

cooperating prisoners, most of whom are serving life sentences. These inmates are carefully vetted and selected for the program, and there are eight prisons that are participating. The dogs are trained there for a year, learning basic commands, actually sharing the cells of these prisoners. Some of these prisoners have trained over a couple dozen dogs. Then, the dogs go back for more training at the leader dog facility, as are potential owners. Finally, they go to the home of a designated foster parent. The dogs they normally use for leader dogs are black, yellow, or blond labradors because they have been found to be the easiest to bond with a person. Scott noted that after identifying a particular chair to the dog, it would take the owner to that chair, no matter where you placed it, later, upon command to the dog. Lion Scott said the only mode of transport that such a dog cannot manage for the owner is an escalator. So, as long as an air terminal has an elevator, air-travel is not out of bounds for a blind person with a leader dog. Given the proper command, the dog will find an elevator in a building and can press the right button with its nose. Scott said that the facility currently places around 170 dogs per year. This is done at no cost to the recipient, funded entirely by philanthropic support—covering travel, room and board, equipment, meals, and training.

Leader Dogs, for the Blind began in 1939 when members of Detroit's Uptown Lions Club sought to assist their blind friend. Over the years, it has enabled 14,500 guide dog partnerships. This facility certainly falls under the Lions challenge from Helen Keller to be "Knights of the Blind." Lion Scott gave us an encouraging presentation that should make us all proud as Lions.



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Other Business

Lion Scott advised us that our BOD approved making a contribution to Helen Keller-Ivy Green by purchasing 3 memorial-walk bricks in the memory and honor of 3 of our Lions: Wendell Copeland, Gordon Boyd, and Gary Murphree. Likewise, our Branch Club also made a decision to honor with brick purchases their Lion of the Year, Linda Cotten, and Immediate Past President, Lion Stephanie Lawson. He also noted the BOD purchased an 8-person table for the North-Alabama Agriplex for its fund-raising dinner, as well as a separate significant funding Agriplex contribution. The BOD also made a contribution to he Cullman County Veterans Hall of Fame.

Lion James Howard had gall bladder surgery and after a few extra days of recovery at the hospital, he was moved to rehab for a few days, also. Lion Javon Daniel continues recovery and stabilization from heart related issues and is able to work several hours a day or two each week at Cullman Caring for Kids. He said he misses our Club and expects to be able to attend meetings eventually. Bill Wilt was told to get a few days of bed rest to recover after hospitalization following his episode of heart enzyme disfunction. He is in good spirits. Lion Ron Seybold is taking a break from the latest series of his cancer treatments until September 3rd.

Lion President Delane Ray announced years-ofservice anniversaries for two Lions: Steve Murphree – 33 years, Steve Rogers – 3.

Lion Randy Kraft announced dates for the Alabama Association of Fairs which our Club is sponsoring for the second year in a row. Those dates are February 19-22, 2026. Last year there were 78 attendees; this year they have more


associates and expect around 100. Lion Randy invited Club member to visit during this event to gain appreciation for this organization and the problems faced by many fairs throughout our State.
