Program

Lion Jerry Bonner introduced Past Lions International Director, Lion Jerome Thompson, who spoke about the Lions Quest program. LCIF's Lions Quest program is an evidencebased social and emotional learning program with an already established series of progressing classes. These classed are built especially for at-risk, abused, and neglected children to acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions; and to set, and achieve goals, developing feeling and showing empathy for others, establishing positive relationships, and making responsible decisions. The absence of such a program paints a stark picture. Studies have shown that sixty percent of these at risk children die 20 years earlier than the norm. 700,000 children will stand before judges this year; every day 14,000 kids are suspended from school; and every 5 minutes, 25 kids are placed in foster homes.

The Lions Quest program can accommodate children from kindergarten through the 12th

grade. It is designed to create learning, based on the needs of all students in an environment in which no one is an outsider because everyone is needed, valued, and important. It seeks to involve parents, community volunteer-mentors, and existing community child-focused organizations, judicial court system, and law enforcement organizations.

In the past Lions have tried to persuade teachers to run the program, but teachers tend to be already overworked and under-paid; thus, this approach, alone, has not worked very well.

When the courts are involved, instead of juvenile detention, children can be sentenced to probation of attending the Lions Quest classes offered by this program. Kids who complete the program rarely continue to break the law, and most continue to be successful adults. Lion Jerome told of his moving experiences when he taught Lion Quest classes and functioned as a mentor.

We had several of our Lions who asked questions and expressed an interest in moving the program forward in Cullman. Lion President Chris Brooks stated that Lion Jerome would participate in the BOD meeting tonight to offer more specifics toward implementing the program. The Lion Quest program has the potential to be a great asset to our community. A big challenge will be having enough class leaders and mentors to keep such a program up and running, long term.

Other Business

Lion Tom Pfeifer paid a visit to Lion David Grantz in room 212 at the Cullman Health & Rehab Center. Lion Dave is mobile -- out of bed
