Program

Lion Richard White introduced our speaker Mr. Albert Pugh, Executive Director and one of the founders of the Cullman Re-entry Addiction Assistance (CREAA) organization, also known for its Brian Clay House facility. Other key founders that were part of this organization's establishment and incorporation include Dr. Bill Peinhardt and Jo Kreps. Their vision has been to provide a non-profit transitional home for men that would be a safe place for those who had no place to go after completion of addiction-related programs. Its home is not a handout, it is a hand up, and a way forward for those that truly want to re-start their lives. Its first Board of Directors meeting was held in October of 2017, and opened its first transitional home for men in Cullman, Alabama on April 1, 2018. Mr. Pugh gave special thanks to our Club for its donation which

This facility was once the old Shady Grove Baptist Church and can now accommodate 36 men, and they stay full most of the time.

Albert explained that the men who seek assistance are essentially broke with no means

of support. Most come directly from drug rehab or from jail for drug-related offenses. The program does not take in anyone who is still in active addiction, and these men are required to work regular jobs to earn money and to pay room and board. They need rules and structure back in their lives and guidance in getting a job, food, shelter, and in taking responsibility for their own lives. They get help in getting a driver's license or some form of I.D. and in clearing any existing warrants with law-enforcement. They get out of their old neighborhoods, lifestyles, and bad influencers. They attend church regularly. They have classes, guidance counselors, classes on money management, and group discussions on improving their lives. They are provided with transportation to and from work. The ages of the clients are currently from 20 to 57. The length of stay has been from a few months to 2 years. Men are asked to leave the house if they fail a drug test, get in a fight, or steal anything.

This organization is playing a valuable role in turning men from a failed or criminal life into valued citizens for our community.

Other Business
